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Pilot task overview

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Task definition

- Given an article **P**, find snippets:
 - from Wikipedia articles \neq **P**
 - in one of the specified languages
 - important for the topic of **P**
 - adding new information content to **P**
- User model:
 - author or reader of **P** who wants to find *more* about the topic
 - E.g., Philips Records and Vertigo Records

Corpus

- XML dumps of Wikipedias (March 2006)
 - English: 660K, Spanish: 80K, Dutch: 125K
 - Many thanks to Ludovic Denoyer and INEX
- XML annotation:
 - Titles, content, links, wiki markup
 - Simple sentence splitting
 - Automatic categorization: PER, ORG, LOC

Topics and tasks

- Topic = Wikipedia article
 - long / short / stub articles
- 4 tasks:
 - Monolingual: English, Spanish, Dutch
 - Bilingual: English-Dutch
 - topics and snippets in either language
- For each task:
 - 50 topics of PER/LOC/ORG
 - plus 10-17 “optional” topics of other types

System response

- For each topic, a system returns:
 - ranked list of snippets (=sentences)
 - Only top 10 snippets were considered in the evaluation

Assessment

- For each topic each returned snippet manually assessed as:
 - **supported**, i.e., from Wikipedia
 - **important** for the topic
 - **novel** wrt. to the content of the topic
 - **not repeated** wrt. earlier snippets
- Sequential assessment, to save assessors' time

Evaluation measures

- Average **yield**
 - # of found “good” snippets / # topics
- **MRR** (mean reciprocal rank)
 - of “good” snippets
- Overall **precision**
 - # of “good” found snippets / # all found
 - “good” = supported, important, novel, not repeated

Participants

- English: 6 teams, 12 submitted runs
 - U. Alicante, U. Amsterdam, U. Essex/Limerick, LexiClone Inc., U. Politecnica de Valencia, U. Wolverhampton
- Spanish: 3 teams, 4 submitted runs
 - U. Alicante, Daedalus consortium, U. Politecnica de Valencia
- Dutch: 1 team, 3 submitted runs
- English-Dutch: 1 team, 1 submitted run
 - U. Amsterdam

Results

	Yield	MRR	Precision
English	1.5–3.4	0.3–0.6	0.2–0.4
Spanish	1.1–1.8	0.3–0.4	0.2–0.3
Dutch	3.2–3.8	0.5	0.4–0.5
English-Dutch	5.0	0.5	0.5

Findings and conclusions

- Wikipedia — useful and interesting multi/cross lingual collection
- WiQA'2006 task:
 - tractable
 - yet challenging
 - evaluation is reliable (inter-assessor agreement)
- Cross-lingual task is not that difficult (!)

Philips Records

Philips Records is the record label of Dutch electronics giant Philips. It was started as Philips Phonografische Industries (PPI) in 1950. During much of the 1950s, it served to distribute recordings made by the US Columbia Records label in the United Kingdom. In 1962 Philips Records and Deutsche Grammophon were linked into the Phonogram Records joint venture.

In the eighties Philips Classics Records was formed to distribute its classics artists.

Philips Records is currently part of Universal Music.
